Organisation & Facilitation

The “Contested Governance” Summer School is organised by the Arnold Bergstraesser Institute at the University of Freiburg and funded by the German Academic Exchange Service.

Arnold Bergstraesser Institute (ABI)

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The ABI is one of Germany’s major research centres in the domain of comparative area studies. As independent research institute associated with the University of Freiburg, its interdisciplinary research focuses on power transformations, state institutions, societal conflicts and forced migration in the Global South. The ABI library hosts one of the largest collections on Area and Development Studies in Germany.

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The DAAD is the world’s largest funding organisation for the international exchange of students and researchers. Since it was founded in 1925, around two million scholars in Germany and abroad have received DAAD funding.

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About the Summer School

The “Contested Governance” Summer School is exclusively offered to current DAAD In-Country/In-Region scholarship holders (Master or PhD students) in countries of the Global South who have a primary qualification (at least a Bachelor degree) in political sciences or other social sciences.

Before Corona struck the world in early 2020, the summer school had been designed as a four-week intensive programme tailored to prepare participants for leading roles in research and teaching. Thematically, the focus was meant to lie on governance and its multiple challenges, starting from the observation that governance is contested in various ways. Debates were meant to arise around core questions of modern societies, such as how actors in the governance system, e. g. civil society, interest groups or state officials, constantly form and reform governance systems. This programme was to be enriched by training courses in social science methods and additional “soft skills”, such as presentation techniques as well as excursions.

The corona virus obliges us to move the summer school from classroom to “Zoom”. We appreciate the multiple possibilities modern communication technologies offer, but we are fully aware that much of the added value from the physical attendance of a summer school – such as cultural exposure, meeting experts and making friends – cannot be copied 1:1 into virtual platforms.

We therefore present some selected essentials from the originally planned programme, and cordially reiterate our invitation to every selected participant to attend the full summer school programme in Freiburg in summer 2021. You will be very heartily welcome then!

For this year, we hope you enjoy and benefit from the ten online sessions we have prepared. Conceptually, the first week will offer different approaches to basic concepts and challenges of contemporary governance, while the second week will take the Covid-19 pandemic as a timely example for “Contested Governance”: this virus challenged governance around the globe, and the central question will be how states and societies will respond to this challenge, which measures will need to be taken to limit the damage and eventually end the crisis, and what lessons we as a global community of people will learn from these exceptional circumstances we are currently struggling with.
